### YOUR INPUT IS NEEDED!

Pennsylvania's Department of Community and Economic Development

(DCED) works with the PA State Planning Board to prepare the State Land Use and Growth Management Report every five years. The report studies development patterns and local government land use planning, and makes recommendations for state agency action, regulations, and programs.

Each municipality is asked to submit <u>one survey response</u>, due March 12, 2025. One staff member in each municipality with the most knowledge of the jurisdiction's policies should be designated to complete this 5-minute survey. Your input is vital to help shape policies and support all PA communities.

# Real Estate Tax Discount

An Ordinance of the Allegheny County Council was passed on February 10, 2025, extending the County real estate tax 2% discount deadline from March 31, 2025 to April 30, 2025, and the gross/face period deadline from May 1, 2025 to May 31, 2025.

What does this mean for home and property owners in your municipality? <u>KDKA reported</u> that Real Estate Tax bills were mailed out on February 14. The Tax Discount extension will make it easier for property owners to make those payments. <u>Trib Live reports</u> that the printed bills might still bear the old deadline. For the most updated Real Estate Tax information, visit the <u>County Treasurer's</u> <u>Real Estate Tax website.</u> Tax payers may choose to pay their bills online through the <u>Allegheny County Real Estate</u> <u>Portal</u>.

#### Zero Compromises on Safety For All

The Southwestern Pennsylvania Commission (SPC), along with the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT), Allegheny County, and the City of Pittsburgh, are furthering their commitment to ending traffic deaths and serious injuries on roads within Allegheny County through a new safety initiative called **Vision Zero.** 

Vision Zero is a proven method of making streets safer. **Its goal is to eliminate all fatal and serious injury traffic crashes**. Endorsed by the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT), Vision Zero helps us identify problems and sets a path toward reducing the loss of precious lives and the associated costs to our communities. This coordinated planning effort will result in a comprehensive Safety Action Plan for Allegheny County.

1. Complete a Safety Survey

2. Use the interactive map to show where pedestrians feel unsafe 3. Leave a general comment

### Duquesne and Glassport are awarded Public Health Funds

As part of the U.S. Steel Clairton Coke Works fire settlement, Allegheny County will receive \$4.5 million to be distributed over the next 5 years as grant funding for public health projects in the immediately affected municipalities. This grant is known as the **Mon Valley Public Health and Welfare Fund.** During the first round of funding, \$250,000 were awarded to six projects, two of which were to SRCOG member municipalities.

Glassport Community Development Corporation secured funding to create a community garden space, including site preparation and equipment purchase.

SRCOG partnered with Duquesne to submit their application. Funds will be used to purchase and distribute respiratory-friendly cleaning products to City residents. A Jefferson Regional Hospital mobile clinic will be at the distribution site to conduct free health screenings. The City is already working on an application for Round 2 of funding which will begin accepting applications on March 24. This time, in response to the high number of residents who suffer from asthma and other respiratory conditions, Duquesne will request funds to purchase and distribute home air purifiers. ACED Housing Division Manager Nathan Wetzel, who oversees the MVPH program suggests applicants consider self-sustaining projects that can be implemented in a relatively short time. Mr. Wetzel advises being mindful that during this round, they expect more applications, and \$450,000 will be shared by all approved projects in Allegheny County. There is no maximum request amount, but extremely large requests are not likely to receive funding.

Dr. Iulia Vann from the Allegheny County Department of Health will help review the applications. She advises that projects addressing clean air and the reduction of greenhouse gases are favorable, but any public health initiative will be considered. Other projects that were during Round 1 include an air purifier distribution and public education event; the purchase of AED units for a fire and rescue team; expanding counseling, support, and education services for individuals affected by gun violence; and funding for caseworkers and health supplies for Rainbow Kitchen Community Services.

Do you have an idea for a public health or clean air project in your community? MVPH parameters have been left loose to allow a wide variety of applications. The application process is simple and SRCOG **Government Grants Manager Jenny Kwiatek** will be glad to help you put your idea into action.
